# The Week in Focus

**APR 14, 2025 - APR 20, 2025** 

Large-scale violence dominated the week. Terrorists killed at least 40 villagers in Plateau State and over 15 vigilantes in Kwara, while Boko Haram struck a resettled community in Borno. Mass kidnappings continued, with eight people seized in Enugu in addition to earlier abductions in Kaduna and Abia. Armed raids in Benue and a fresh bandit assault in Zamfara underscored the fragility of rural security. Abuja's fuel-subsidy protests remained mostly peaceful but disruptive. Businesses should plan for troop deployments on northern highways, possible displacement across the Middle Belt, and sporadic urban unrest if economic grievances deepen.

### Crime Watch

### **Terrorism**

- Borno: Suspected Boko Haram fighters attacked the newly resettled Yamtake village, Gwoza LGA, killing two soldiers and an unconfirmed number of civilians.
- Kwara: An emerging North Central terror cell stormed Kemanji, killing more than 15 local vigilantes and residents.

# Kidnapping

• Enugu: Eight people—including a priestess and four farmers—abducted at Ohebe Orba, Udenu LGA

## **Armed Robbery**

• Benue: Armed Fulani herdsmen raided several communities, looting homes and livestock in Ukum LGA.

### Homicide

- Plateau: At least 40 killed in a dawn assault on Zike village, Bassa LGA.
- Benue: Suspected herdsmen attacked Otobi community, causing multiple fatalities and burning homes.

## Geo-Political Factors

• **No major cross-border incidents** reported. Nonetheless, communal tensions and armed group activities continue to influence regional stability, requiring coordinated security efforts.

# The Week Ahead

Middle-Belt Revenge Attacks

Reinforce site security and journey-management for staff operating in Plateau, Benue, and Kwara; liaise with local authorities for real-time updates.

Fuel-Subsidy Strike Threat

Activate business-continuity plans for Lagos and Abuja; pre-position critical supplies and expect airport/port slowdowns.
